# From The Principal

This is a credit to the relatively young group of students and to Jack Heaven, their passionate mentor and conductor. We also congratulate Ethan Hopgood, who was a recipient of the Blanchard Award; an award open to talented instrumental students in either their first or second year of high school.

### **Technology and Timeless Principles**

Mobile communication devices have become an important and invaluable part of our modern lifestyle. When we talk about mobile communication devices we are referring to a range of devices, the most common being mobile telephones. As a society, we are growing in our understanding of how technology can be used in different contexts, with varying purposes and with respect for, as well as presence to, others. These are all capabilities that are highly valued in life beyond school and in the world of work.

In a school community that fosters the competence and individuality of each child or adolescent we are also seeing the many benefits of our Senior School BYOD (Bring Your Own Device) policy. The school understands there are times when possession of these devices can provide a sense of safety and security while travelling to and from school.

I think it is critical to realise that technology and the array of mobile communication devices are our tools. They do not replace timeless principles and ways of being. In our Catholic school community, we ask staff, students and parents to carefully consider the following when they use technological tools:

ler the following when they use technologica

Respect: How do our behaviours show that we respect one another?

Intention: What is the learning intention?

Presence: How do our behaviours show that we are present to others?

Teacher Craft: How do I express my teacher craft or how does the situation allow me to express my craft?

As a school community, we are clear that mobile communication devices may only be used during school time at a teacher's discretion. Students are required to turn off all notifications and keep mobile phones on silent and out of sight while at school.



In the Middle School, students are asked to place their phone in their locker, unless required as part of the intentional learning program as discerned by the respective teacher.

Listening to music in class on personal devices is not an EY-12 school endorsed activity unless it forms part of the teacher's intentional learning program or a student's Individual Learning Plan.

Year 12 students may utilise their personal communication devices in the PRC Common Room during study periods to listen to music as an accompaniment to study. This would not occur at other times.

I thank students, staff and parents for assisting us to clarify the nuances of our policy in what is at the same time a space of great opportunity, but also with the potential for undermining the respect and presence we have to one another.

I look forward to our support of one another in assisting our young to harness the wonderful potential of technology, while also appreciating that it does not define who we are, but is only a tool that enhances our humanness, multi-faceted potential and life journey.

### Carpark Care

I remind families of the care required in the carpark area. The speed limit of 15km / hour is designed to assist with maintaining the safety of all community members. Likewise, the smooth running of the 'kiss and drop' area depends on the courtesy of all users to keep the traffic moving. Should children not be at the 'kiss and drop' area ready for pick up, I ask parents to complete another cycle of the area to ensure others can collect their waiting children.

#### Food Allergy Awareness - awareness, avoidance and action

Living with the risk of a severe allergic reaction, or anaphylaxis, takes planning, diligence and clear communication. At Tenison Woods College we believe that our community has a significant role in supporting those who live with the risk, so that through awareness, education and training they and their families can lead normal, healthy lives.

The website <u>Allergy Facts</u> offers support for individuals, parents and carers of people living with this risk, supporting the critical more personalised treatment and care. We encourage anyone who suspects they may have an allergy or those who have already been diagnosed to consult their allergist, immunologist, paediatrician or GP for personalised treatment and care. This includes regular follow-up so that they can access up to date information on managing their risk of anaphylaxis, and communicating that information to our staff so that our community can support them in the best possible way.

### **Parish Planned Giving Rebate**

I remind families that parents contributing to the Parish Planned Giving may claim a rebate from Tuition Fees of 50% of their contribution up to a maximum claim of \$750. Official Parish receipts are to be presented to the Finance Department after the 30 June 2019 for a deduction to be made.

#### Staff Professional Development Days – 6 and 7 June

Staff are looking forward to the staff professional development days on Thursday 6 and Friday, 7 of June, when they will devote time to the learning and assessment experiences prepared for students, as well as the wellbeing approach at the College.

I trust students and parents will experience the benefits of the days through our service to students and families throughout the College. I remind families that these two days will be student-free days (the ELCC and OSHC will be open).

The College would like to wish Ethan all the best as he continues to shine with his Jazz abilities.




# Drama Students go 'off book' with Renato Musolino

The Junior Sport Voucher scheme is a government funded initiative to bring down the cost of sport for Junior students in Reception to Year 7. Please be aware, you can only use this voucher once per child this year. If you choose to use it for Auskick, you cannot use it again for any other sport fee at school or club level. If you choose to use the Junior Sport Voucher, it is a very simple process of ticking a box during registration and providing your Medicare number.

This voucher is a \$100 credit, effectively making the Auskick program free if you choose to use it. For any families that don't have access to the internet, please call into the Front Office and complete the registration.

Registration pays for the sessions, insurance and some AFL gear that will be sent to your home address.

Sessions this year will be run by the Tenison Woods College PE team.

The annual Cross Country Championship in Naracoorte is being held THIS FRIDAY, 10 May. This is for any students who qualified in Years 3-7.




### SAPSASA Football and Netball

# Counsellor's Corner -Speak so young people will listen

This week in Counsellor's Corner we will look at talking in a way that will get young people to listen. If you find that your teenage son or daughter's eyes glaze over the minute you start to talk to them, then don't despair! Sometimes all it takes is a small change to encourage your young person to listen to what you have to say. These five tips will help parents and teachers speak so that young people will listen!!

### 1. Tell them what you'll do

Control is a big issue for young people. Threaten their need for control by telling them what to do and you risk them tuning off. Let them feel that they are calling the shots, by focusing on your behaviour rather than telling them what to do. Instead of ordering "Clean your room now!" say "I only go into bedrooms that are neat and tidy." The shift in language is small but the impact can be significant as your young person is making the decision about their behaviour.

### 2. Bring others into the act

If your son or daughter is more likely to listen to adults other than you, consider using these favoured adults as leverage when holding important conversations. "I think Jay's dad would tell you that you need to be careful going to a party in that part of town." Referencing admired adults is a great way to get around a young person's natural defensiveness and their suspicion that their parents exist only to spoil their fun.

### 3. Slow communication down

If your son or daughter is adept at using the tightest possible timeframe to get your permission, then develop the habit of buying yourself some time. A young person who asks you just before heading off to school if they can go to a party that night, usually knows intuitively that quick decisions will usually be made in their favour.

If you feel that you've been verbally ambushed by your young person, slow the conversation down rather than reply straight away. "I need to think about that. I'll get back to you after school." Add a time factor rather than be forced to make a snap decision.

### 4. Avoid making eye contact to get cooperation

This strategy is anti-intuitive as we've been trained to make eye contact when we speak to others. However, making eye contact with a young person while telling them to go to bed is challenging them to either argue or ignore you. It is better to use as few words as possible "Erica, it's bed-time" and look away while you're speaking, indicating that you're not willing to engage in verbal banter.

### 5. Put that finger away


Nothing invokes a verbal fight quite like an adult pointing a finger at a young person in an effort to get some cooperation. Finger-pointing cuts straight through to your young person's reptilian brain, inviting them to fight or flee. If you point to the bin indicating it's their turn to clean it, use an open palm. It's a non-threatening way for you to get your message across.

Adolescence is an unpredictable and vulnerable age, when a wrong look or word can turn children against the messenger. Choose your words and your non-verbals carefully so that your young person will listen to the message rather than tune out due to clumsy delivery.


