Year 6 and 7 students from the Regions Catholic Schools collaborate for CoLAB day



Last Wednesday over 120 excited Year 6 and 7 students from all three Catholc schools in our region took part in the Regional Catholic Co-Lab Day at Tenison Woods College. Students from St Anthony's Catholic Primary School, Mary MacKillop Memorial School and Tenison Woods College were all placed in combined groups to experience a range of hands on, collaborative experiences at the College.

In the Science labs, Miss Forrest and Mr de Nys ran an experiment where students used Bunsen Burners to heat up magnesium and notice the change in weight when heated. One group had an extended lesson and they did a 'pop test' by mixing chemicals with heat. This was a big highlight for many of the students.

Mr Creedy in Music had a group of students visit him and form their own bands to rock out on the jam hubs. The students loved playing on instruments that they had not played before, as well as practicing their singing. It was wonderful to see students creating music with their peers and having a lot of fun. Mr Creedy also noticed a few future drummers that he is excited to see in the middle school in the years to come.

Mr Lean and Mr Edwards involved the students in a range of team and individual based fitness and sport activities. The shuttle run at the start of the lesson had the blood pumping before students moved upstairs to the EFM Gym to explore the equipment located in the gym.

Mr Edwards had the students on the court playing handball. In the last two lessons, this group had Tom Daly and Richard Hill take them from some basketball training. This was a highlight for some of the Millicent and Penola students.

The Tech lesson engaged the students with the Laser Cutter and how it is used to make different designs. Mr Colliver had prepared a star shape piece of acrylic for each student and they turned these into key chains through sanding and drilling. Once students had completed their key chains, Mr Gilham had those students launching rockets with the air pressure machine.

In the Home Ec room, Miss Whan and Miss Zaccardo had the students cook four different items of food that ended up being lunch for the students and staff. The students made Pizza Scrolls, Muffins, Sausage Rolls and Fried Rice. It was a very busy space in the kitchen, however Miss Whan and Miss Zaccardo's cooking expertise supported students to ensure each item was prepared in the 40 minute lesson. There was enough food for students to go back for seconds which was a great way to celebrate lunch as a whole group.

The day finished with a Liturgy in the Chapel to celebrate the unique experience of day and the new friendships formed.

A big thanks to all staff who helped with the experience, especially staff that planned and taught the lessons. Also a big congratulations to the students from Tenison Woods College who made the visiting students feel welcomed into our community, it was wonderful to observe.

E-raced harness the power of narrative to empower, inform and engage by using a team of young storytellers who share their experiences as new migrants and refugees with other young Australians. So this is timely and a great opportunity for our students to have insight into the experiences of the local speakers. It will be a wonderful opportunity for us to show these speakers support as they launch into the space of addressing racism by giving voice to their stories.



Year 6 students become Toy Engineers

This term, students in Year 6 have been working on an integrated STEM unit focussing on games and toys.

After learning about circuitry during Science, students were introduced to the real world job of Toy Engineers. With some thorough investigations into what makes a good toy the group were then tasked to create a toy or a game, which had either moving parts, lights or sound.

The classes created their games and toys using common resources and the 'Little Bits' circuit kit. Student's first brainstormed their ideas, then in pairs they discussed and sketched up several options, making sure to focus on the

aspects of 'good gaming. From this they had a discussion with the teacher into the pros and cons of their ideas to finally choose one option.

Students then designed their final option, and started the process of creating prototypes.

Many trials and errors were had during the making phase, with the students applying their knowledge of circuitry to achieve the functions they wanted their toy to have. Some groups had several hurdles and adapted ideas, others tested durability and suitability of different materials that they were hoping to use. There were groups that had to change what they were doing, making decisions together based on what they wanted to achieve. Other groups investigated options by researching.

Wednesday last week, the prototypes for Mrs Sims Years 6 class were finished and ready for testing. The engineers observed their toy being used, questioning the toy against the set criteria.

Currently the class will work with the data they collected to now create a presentation on their toy design.

The toys and games that were created included:

- Josephine the Giraffe Her head sways around and the aim of the game is to get the hoops over her head.
- Operation a buzzing game where you have to remove the parts from the body.
- JoJo's Wire another buzzing game, getting the loop around the wire.
- An interactive Play Kitchen turn on your hot plates, use your scales in imaginative play.
- Wobbly Car a car that has a horn and working lights.
- Twirling Dancer a game where you have to get the dancer to catch the hoops.
- Game of Life an interactive board game.
- Soccer play soccer and use the scoring.
- 8 Ball play 8 ball and get the lights to light up when you pocket the ball.
- Rubber Duckies Can you catch the duckies as they spin on their lilly pads?
- Kingdom of Cards an interactive card game.
- NBA basketball How many shots can you score with a live score board.

The kits will be delivered to females in Timor Leste who do not have access to adequate feminine hygiene resources or education. Special thanks to Vicki and Chelsea Gabriel, Denise Mitselburg and Geraldine Pluckhahn who make the components for the packs and also helped us put the packs together.

This year the Timor Immersion is looking at building a new sister school relationship with Francisco Xavier College, Hatolia. To formalise this partnership a Memorandum of Understanding was signed during the Whole School Mass last week by Father Dean, David Mezinec and Michelle Coote. In Timor-Leste this document will be signed by the Bishop of Dili, the Parish



Priest of Hatolia and myself. This is not a legally binding document but rather, an understanding / agreement that we offer to support and learn from each other over the coming years. It is a very exciting development for the Immersion Trip and we are looking forward to meeting everyone in the community in a few short weeks.

Finally, the Timor-Leste Immersion participants would like to offer a huge THANK YOU to everyone that has supported this year's trip. Every year we are overwhelmed by the generosity of our community and this year has been no different. We look forward to sharing stories and photos when we return.

College Teacher accepted into prestigious 'Dramatic arts' initiative






Shining in the Classroom Green up the Greenhouse!
