This year’s theme for NAIDOC Week 2019 is *Voice. Treaty. Truth. Let’s work together for a shared future.*

The Indigenous voice of this country is over 65,000 plus years old. They are the first words spoken on this continent. Languages that passed down lore, culture and knowledge for over millennia and they are precious to our nation.

It’s that Indigenous voice that includes know-how, practices, skills and innovations - found in a wide variety of contexts, such as agricultural, scientific, technical, ecological and medicinal fields, as well as biodiversity-related knowledge. They are words connecting us to country, an understanding of country and of a people who are the oldest continuing culture on the planet.

And with 2019 being celebrated as the [United Nations International Year of Indigenous Languages](#), we accentuate the importance of indigenous knowledge being heard through the indigenous voice. And of course, this is not just the history of our First Peoples – it is the history of all of us, of all of Australia, and we need to own it, so that we can authentically work together for a shared future.

NAIDOC originally stood for ‘National Aborigines and Islanders Day Observance Committee’. This committee was once responsible for organising national activities during NAIDOC Week and its acronym has since become the name of the week itself. NAIDOC is celebrated not only in Indigenous communities, but by Australians from all walks of life. The week has been a great opportunity to participate in a range of activities and to support our local Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander community. I thank staff, students and parents for the enthusiasm and commitment with which the week is being acknowledged.

Mobile Phones Whilst Driving

It has been brought to our attention that there are many parents/guardians dropping off and picking up their children and adolescents in the mornings and afternoons that have been observed using their mobile phones; either texting or talking whilst seated in the driver's seat of the vehicles. There have been significant concerns raised that this distraction, especially when there are children present, increases the risk of accidents occurring.

Officers from SAPOL have indicated that there seems to be a misconception about the term **use** which have been highlighted from the Australian Road Rules (ARR) 300:

“**use**”, in relation to a mobile phone, includes the following:

- holding the phone to, or near, the ear (whether or not engaged in a phone call);
- creating, sending or looking at a text or video message on the phone;
- turning the phone on or off;
- operating any other function of the phone.”

Further to this, it is common knowledge that using a mobile phone while driving can significantly impair a driver's:

- reaction time;
- visual search patterns;
- ability to maintain speed and position on the road;
- ability to judge safe gaps in the traffic; and
- general awareness of other road users.

SAPOL have informed us that over this week a number of schools will be targeted to reduce the number of fatal and serious injury collisions through effective enforcement and driver education of legislation pertaining to mobile phone use by road users.

I urge parents and carers to heed this warning for the benefit of our young and your families.

Year 11 Retreat

'The Human behind the Mask'

On Monday, 1 July the Year 11 students travelled to Halls Gap in the beautiful setting of The Grampians, for their 3-day annual Retreat. 82 students and a number of staff participated, where the aim was to engage with the theme "The Human behind the Mask".

The first stop was a visit to the Brambuk Cultural Centre where the group was treated to a Welcome to Country by representatives of the local indigenous people. They welcomed and involved us in a traditional smoking ceremony. Learning more about the beautiful landscapes of the Grampians through the eyes of the indigenous people helped us to understand how important it is to have meaningful connections with the land.

Tuesday began with a special type of prayer called 'the Examen', where thought was given to the events of yesterday and the hopes of today. The main focus of this session was to consider the masks that people wear in society. In small groups, the cohort thought about the mask that they present in public, and how they would show their true self to the world around them. A visible expression of this thought was shown in the display of masks created during this time. The next session for the day was all about where we find the fingerprints of God in our lives. Students heard from a staff member to gain some ideas, before venturing out into the Halls Gap township to discover and photograph the beauty in God's world. During this downtime, students were able to strengthen bonds with each other by hiking, relaxing and enjoying ice cream. The focal point of the Retreat was the Liturgy. Students were involved in planning this significant experience and came together in prayer on Wednesday morning to celebrate the learning they have gained over the past few days, then selecting some of their virtues to write or decorate on calico squares, so a year level artwork can be created.

All too quickly, the Retreat was over. It was a full, but rewarding three days. Students and staff built lasting bonds that will give each other the strength to get through the remainder of their schooling, knowing that God is by our sides. I trust all students had a wonderful time bonding with their peers and learning about "the Human behind their Mask".

Year 5 students represent College in Mad Minute Competition



Shining in the Classroom Year 4 students create own choreography

Dance lessons for Year 4 this term has seen students heavily collaborating in groups to create their own choreography for the song 'Holding Out for a Hero'. This song was recorded by Welsh singer Bonnie Tyler for the soundtrack to the 1984 film 'Footloose'. It has involved students making and responding to art-works independently and collaboratively with their classmates and teacher.

As they have made and responded to each other's dances, students have explored interpretation and to which extent the elements of Dance have been applied. They have made personal evaluations of their own and others' art-works as well as given and received feedback.

In Dance this term, the Year 4 students have also had opportunities to:

- Explore and experiment with directions (pathways), time, dynamics and relationships.
- Extend their fundamental movement skills by adding and combining more complex movements.
- Use technical skills including accuracy and awareness of body alignment through repeated practice and refinement.
- Explore and apply the elements in sequences they make.
- Practice using expressive skills and focus when performing dance for themselves and others.



The Marist Brothers and Mercy Sisters Scholarships are available to students of families who may be experiencing financial hardship.


