From The Principal

R U OK? and Putting Your Hand Up to Help Out

R U OK? Day is our National day of action dedicated to reminding everyone that we've all got what it takes to ask, "are you ok?" and support those struggling with life. Taking part can be as simple as learning R U OK?'s four steps, so you can have a conversation that could change a life. The steps are discussed here: <u>https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=TgweO_eY284</u> and are as simple as:

1. Asking R U OK?

- 2. Listen with an open mind.
- 3. Encourage action.
- 4. Check in again afterwards.

This year, in the build-up to R U OK? Day we are encouraging everyone to 'Trust the Signs', 'Trust your Gut' & 'Ask R U OK?'. We want everyone to feel confident they know the signs that someone might need support by listening to what they're saying, seeing what they're doing or knowing what's going on in their life. Whenever you notice a change, no matter how small, we want you to trust your gut and start an R U OK? conversation.

By starting a conversation and commenting on changes you've noticed in people, you could help that family member, friend or workmate open up. If all is well, that person will know you're someone who cares enough to ask. That is precisely the theme of our endeavours this year; individuals matter to the College community and our care for individuals is the ultimate measure of our whole community.

Origins of R U OK Day

In 1995, much-loved Barry Larkin was far from okay. His suicide left family and friends in deep grief and with endless questions. In 2009, his son Gavin Larkin chose to champion just one question to honour his father and to try protecting other families from the pain he has endured.

While collaborating with Janina Nearn on a documentary to raise awareness, the team quickly realised the documentary alone wouldn't be enough. To genuinely change behaviour Australia-wide, a national campaign was needed. From this realisation and with Gavin and Janina's expertise and passion, R U OK? was born.

Gavin remained a passionate champion of the idea that a conversation could change a life, even as cancer ended his life in 2011. His and Janina's legacy is ensuring all Australians realise a little question can make a big difference to those people struggling with life.

I encourage students to get involved and parents to discuss this issue with them at home.

Transforming 'The Pines' - Starting from Week 10, Term 3

To commence our College building program and fulfilling our Master Plan we will be transforming the Year 8/9 classroom area, known as 'The Pines', from a zone of 6 classrooms to a location that will house:

- Poplars
- 12 classrooms
- Staff preparation area
- Breakout spaces
- Student and staff toilets
- Wonderful grounds, with increased play and quiet spaces that accentuate our ecological commitment.

We are aiming to have this new area ready for 28 January, 2020.

To assist with this preparation we will also be asking that at the end of week 9, classes shift from the current Pines classrooms, so transportable removalists and builders can start on the site in week 10. There will be some classroom challenges and parking challenges for week 10 and the first couple of weeks of term 4, however I ask our community to offer their support as much as they are able - it will all be worth it!

This approach will assist Students in the identified year levels to complete the best possible transition processes with the relevant teaching and support Staff. We also look forward to preparing transition programs that will accentuate our relationship with Parents and Carers in the support of Student learning and wellbeing.

I was delighted that the focus of the Staff Reflection Day last Friday 6 September focused on the way we are called to action for all of creation through Pope Francis' "Laudato si" and how we can connect with our common home in ways that enliven our school, local and global community. Counsellor's Corner Asking, 'Are you OK?'

R U OK? seeks to create a world where we're all connected. We are never too young to look out for one another and meaningfully connect.

A range of circumstances can lead to a child feeling low, including:

- Big life changes, like moving house or school
- Experiencing grief or loss
- Being around people going through tough times
- Being bullied
- Arguing with someone
- Problems with school work
- Being bored
- Having a medical condition or chronic illness
- Not sleeping well
- Not exercising enough
- Hormonal changes
- Special needs

Be aware of certain behaviours and signs that can indicate a child might be struggling. The first thing to look out for is changes in behaviour. When people feel low, they often:

- Withdraw from their friends or their family.
- Lash out at people and get angry or upset easily, including towards the people they care about.
- Cry or become emotional.
- Lose interest in activities and things they usually love.
- Have changed sleeping patterns. They might be sleeping all the time, not sleeping much at all, or sleeping at strange hours (such as in the middle of the day).
- Change of appetite. They could be eating more than usual, or less.

Children cannot be expected to fix someone's problems, nor know the best way to help and support. However they can be encouraged to listen to what their friend is saying, let them know they care and tell a teacher, school counsellor or trusted adult if they are worried about their friend. By promoting an environment of positive peer support and accessing support channels via an adult, children can learn that asking, 'Are you OK?' is a key life skill.

R U OK? has 4 steps that might help navigate a conversation when someone says, "No, I'm not OK".

- These steps are:
- 1. Ask
- 2. Listen
- **Encourage action** 3. Check in 4.

Shining Light Awards Recipient -Ken Green

Introducing one of this year's Shining Light Recipients: Ken Green

Ken Green was born in England. He, his parents and siblings moved to Australia in 1961. Ken began his time at Marist Brother's College in 1964. He had a fondness for sport, was a College House Captain and won numerous long distance running events as well as setting Athletics Records during his time at the College.

Academically, Ken enjoyed Mathematics, Physics and Chemistry. After his schooling, he began working as a Forestry Technical Assistant in 1969. In the early 70's, Ken travelled and explored the world. Upon his return to Australia in 1977, he began studying at the University of Canberra. He achieved a Bachelor of Applied Science (CCAE) and PhD in Zoology (ANU). His passion for Zoology and Botany led him to research projects all around Australia and the world, including 7 Antarctic trips.

Ken has produced over 150 peer-reviewed papers - mostly Zoology, but also Botany, Glaciology, Soils & Geology, Hydrology, Lake Chemistry, Archaeology and Climate Change, along with three published books - one in 2nd edition. Ken has featured in ABC's "From the Heart" series and Catalyst, as well as assisting with David Attenborough's "Life of Mammals" documentary series in Kosciuszko National Park.

Ken convened the Australian Institute of Alpine studies for 15 years and organised many conferences. He was the Australasian and Zoologist representative on the "Global Mountain and Biodiversity Assessment" for 10 years. He spent 30 years as a firefighting crew leader, where he received the Australian Service Medal. Ken was also involved in Search & Rescue for more than 30 years - and was even officially thanked by the Czech Republic after one particular rescue. The National Parks & Wildlife Service awarded Ken the 'Service Medallion'.

Prior to retirement, Ken worked as Principle Research Scientist for NSW National Parks & Wildlife Services until he suffered a stroke in 2017. The stroke affected him greatly. He lost his speech and ability to read and write. Through ongoing assistance and sheer perseverance, Ken learned to talk, read and write again through re-reading many of his early childhood schoolbooks. Over the last 2 years, Ken managed to regain his speech and ability to read and write to the level where he is now able to continue with his academic work on a voluntary basis, post retirement.

Today, Ken continues to keep himself busy with international research projects and shows no signs of slowing down.
