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
Mother's Day Breakfast

As we celebrate motherly care of those who are with us and those who are now enjoying their heavenly reward, we also acknowledge that during May we as a Catholic Church offer our devotion to Mary; our model of devoted motherhood, grace, unconditional love and maternal integrity.

National Families Week - Stronger Families, Stronger Communities

The United Nations General Assembly, in its resolution 47/237 of 20 September 1993, proclaimed that 15 May of every year shall be observed as the International Day of Families. The United Nations states that "this annual observance reflects the importance which the international community attaches to families as basic units of society as well as its concern regarding their situation around the world. The International Day of Families provides an opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families as well as to promote appropriate action. The Day can become a powerful mobilising factor on behalf of families in all countries, which avail themselves of this opportunity and demonstrate support of family issues appropriate to each society."

National Families Week coincides with the United Nations International Day of Families on 15 May. All Australians, including community organisations, schools, councils, companies and individuals are invited to participate in National Families Week each year.

Following up on the theme of the 59th session of the Commission for Social Development: "Socially just transition towards sustainable development: the role of digital technologies on social development and wellbeing of all" the 2021 observance of the International Day of Families focuses on the impacts of new technologies on the wellbeing of families.

Megatrends, including new technologies, demographic shifts, rapid urbanisation, and migration trends, as well as climate change, have been dramatically shaping our world. The prolonged COVID-19 pandemic demonstrates the importance of digital technologies for work, education and communication. The pandemic has accelerated technological changes that had already been under way both in society and at work, including the expanded use of digital platforms and related technological innovations like cloud computing and the use of big data and algorithms.

In preparation for the Thirtieth Anniversary of the International Year of the Family, 2024 (IYF+30) the United Nations aims to raise awareness of megatrends noted above and responsive family-oriented policies to tackle their effects.

In recognition of National Families Week, 15-21 May, we are reminded to reflect on the role families play in our community and the importance of celebrating the presence and meaning of family, as the protectors, first educators and nurturers of children and young people. We know that living in loving and stable families is an important safety factor for children. To support children and keep them safe we understand the importance of supporting their families also, especially those who may be experiencing stress or difficult times. The encouragement of family life is a key focus in our Archdiocese and within our school and parish team. National Families Week is an important opportunity for us to welcome and embrace the richness and diversity families bring to our parish communities.

2021 NAPLAN Testing

Students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9 will be undertaking the four NAPLAN tests of Writing, Reading, Language Conventions and Numeracy in Weeks 3 and 4 this Term, commencing yesterday Tuesday 11 May.

Families of students in Years 3 and 5 have had details of testing times sent home via a class newsletter. Years 7 and 9 families will have had a broadcast sent with times of the four tests

Demonstration tests are available at the following site: https://www.nap.edu.au/online-assessment/public-demonstration-site if you are interested in familiarising yourselves with the type of questions asked. Students have already undertaken at least one practice test here at the College. Students with their own devices should still have a Lock Down Browser installed to use for the testing. If students have new devices they may need to re-install this

It is also really helpful if students in Years 7 and 9 bring their own corded headphones, as all tests have an aural element. We do have some spare headphones if this is not possible. Please feel welcome to contact your child's Home Group teacher or Chris Lloyd with any questions or concerns you may have.

Carpark Care

I remind families of the care required in the carpark area. The speed limit of 15km/hour is designed to assist with maintaining the safety of all community members. Likewise, the smooth running of the 'kiss and drop' area depends on the courtesy of all users to keep the traffic moving. Should children not be at the 'kiss and drop' area ready for pick up, I ask parents to complete another cycle of the area to ensure others can collect their waiting children.

HHDL Four Point Plan

Our current national context in recent times reminds us of the 'precarious confidence' that is present. I firmly believe that our complacency will be our enemy in the next eight months, and as such I reiterate that we will be continuing deliberately and carefully with our HHDL Strategy in Term 2.

During Term 2, the health and wellbeing of students, families and staff remains our priority. We will continue to ensure that our school is a safe environment, maintaining the additional cleaning regime which was commenced in 2020.

Food Allergies - awareness, avoidance and action

Living with the risk of a severe allergic reaction, or anaphylaxis, takes planning, diligence and clear communication. At Tenison Woods College we believe that our community has a significant role in supporting those who live with the risk, so that through awareness, education and training they and their families can lead normal, healthy lives.

The website http://www.allergyfacts.org.au offers support for individuals, parents and carers of people living with this risk, supporting the critical more personalised treatment and care. We encourage anyone who suspects they may have an allergy or those who have already been diagnosed to consult their allergist, immunologist, paediatrician or GP for personalised treatment and care. This includes regular follow-ups so that they can access up to date information on managing their risk of anaphylaxis, and communicating that information to our staff so that our community can support them in the best possible way.

Staff Professional Development Days - 10 and 11 June

Staff are looking forward to the staff professional development days on Thursday 10 June and Friday 11 June, when they will devote time to literacy and numeracy experiences in the Junior School, Integrated curriculum in the Middle School, Student Agency in the Senior School, as well as evolving further our wellbeing approach at the school. Education Support Officers will also have the opportunity to complete the Youth Mental Health First Aid Course.

I trust students and parents will experience the benefits of the days through our service to students and families throughout the College. I remind families that these days are student-free days.

As we continue towards the middle of Term 2, one the busiest times at Tension Woods College, we all have a focus on learning. Within the past three weeks many things have been happening at the College. Our Year 3, 5, 7 and 9 students have been preparing for NAPLAN where they are being assessed on their literacy and numeracy skills; an online test which started this week and will continue for 2 weeks.


As for the Year 12s, they will be completing assignments and sitting tests to prepare for their exams, the final stage of their schooling.

Within this, the senior school are getting the best of help with the assistance of the After-School Study Centre. Please see the poster below to view what is offered throughout the week. The College also provides a program called Studiosity, a 24/7 on-demand study help, with Student Mentors that provide feedback on literacy skills and core subject support. Giving students the confidence to persevere, to normalise academic enquiry, to independently produce more thoughtful work, and to arrive in class better prepared. Studiosity can be accessed through SEQTA.

The College has also recently created fitness sessions that are part of the study centre concept. These sessions take place every Wednesday morning from 7:30am to 8:15am, known as 'The Club'. The Club provides and focuses on strength and conditioning, nutrition tips and support in a great positive environment, with each session followed by a shared breakfast.

If students need a shared space with their peers or individually, the College library is a great space for students to read, study or complete assignments. The library offers newspapers, magazines, e-books, laptops and many more resources that aid in learning. Students who have an interest in music, are able to go to the library on Monday, at lunch times, to use a device called a 'groovebox', a music instrument that allows students to practice or be creative.

And again, though it is a big term, Tenison Woods College provides the resources for students to strive for success, making the ordinary extraordinary.





National Simultaneous Storytime

National Simultaneous Storytime (NSS) is held annually by the Australian Library and Information Association (ALIA). This will be taking place in Week 4 on Wednesday 19 May at 10:30am.

Every year a picture book, written and illustrated by an Australian author and illustrator, is read simultaneously in libraries, schools, pre-schools, childcare centres, family homes, bookshops and many other places around the country. This is now in its 21st successful year.

The College has been running this event in the school since 2008. It is a colourful, vibrant and fun event that aims to promote the value of reading and literacy, using an Australian children's book that explores age-appropriate themes, and addresses key learning areas of the National Curriculum for Reception to Year 6.

This year the College is very excited that the book is going to be live streamed from space and read by NASA Astronaut Shannon Walker.

The College has asked the Junior School classes to participate in a Science experiment from the International Space Station. The classes will take the temperature outside on the morning of Wednesday 12 May and Satellite observations will be recorded on this date also. The data will be collected from the experiment and then compared by the satellite to work out an average temperature in Australia at that time.

The team over at Science Time From Space will be collecting the data collated by the astronauts on the International Space Station and provide a video of the experiment, outlining what the astronauts found, comparing it to what NSS participants found and what this all means. The information will be collected and shared, along with the astronaut experiment video.

The experiment is designed to shed some light on the important issue of climate change. The science concept shown will be that changing the surface of Earth results in changes to sun/earth/space heat balance.

STEM Girls

Four Year 10 girls, Mia Pauser-Jones, Gianna Morello, Stella Fritsche and Gael Chinzungu, were recently selected to participate in the STEM Girls program on behalf of the College. STEM Girls is a University of South Australia program encouraging girls to continue the study of Science and Mathematics throughout their schooling and into university. The program consists of two inquiry days at UniSA in Mount Gambier with other local schools and culminates with a 2 day conference in Adelaide in August. The range of opportunities the girls will be exposed to include:

- · enhancing knowledge and understanding of STEM concepts
- · forming networks with like-minded peers
- meeting and networking with women in STEM careers
- providing career information to support a STEM career pathway.

The students enjoyed the first day held last week where they investigated mathematical modelling of population growth and then learnt how to interpret this data and apply it to controlling infectious disease and vaccinating the world. In the second workshop they learnt about the importance of blood in the human body and the genetics of blood disorder.

3D-Printed Dice for Visually-Impaired Student

Year 1 student, Declan Lee, was born without vision due to a condition called 'Leber's congenital amaurosis'. Declan has a number of ESO's who assist him with his orientation and learning at school. As he can read braille, myself and his other ESO's make braille and tactile resources for him to access his learning.

In March, I was fortunate to be able to travel to Adelaide for a 2-day workshop at SASVI (South Australian School for Vision-Impaired) about braille and preparing and using resources to assist students with a vision impairment. A resource displayed was dice with raised dots made on a 3D printer, which enables a visually-impaired student to identify the numbers on each side by touch.

Through collaboration with Pathways Coordinator Elisa Lawrie and Design and Technology Teacher George Adamopoulos, we were able to print the same dice at our College using one of our 3D printers. George downloaded a pre-made CAD file needed to produce these special dice. As the dice are very similar to regular dice, Declan's classmates can also use them with him, promoting inclusivity. Within four days of the project being proposed I was able to hand Declan the finished product; he was thrilled about them and can't wait to use them in class with his friends.
