National Volunteers Week

National Volunteer Week (NVW) is Australia's largest annual celebration of volunteers. From Monday 17 May to Sunday 23 May 2021, NVW celebrates the significant contribution of Australia's almost six million volunteers.

The theme for NVW 2021 is 'Recognise. Reconnect. Reimagine.' which acknowledges that it is time to: recognise or celebrate and thank volunteers for the vital role they play in our lives; reconnect to what is important by giving our time to help others and ourselves; reimagine how we better support volunteers and communities they help.

I am so proud of our staff, students and parents who volunteer their service on a roster every Saturday morning to ensure that the Vinnies Shop on Crouch Street is able to offer its service on Saturdays. They tell me that the commitment to volunteering and serving our community is only rivalled by the sense of fun, welcome and community that is created each Saturday.

It is through such examples of volunteering that we appreciate the true essence of our school motto, Let your Light Shine. The Gospel indicates "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven" (Matthew 5:13-16). As such our shining is about inspiring others to a good life and ultimately so that they can be invited to see and experience the abundance of God's love.

Laudato Si' Week

We are celebrating Laudato Si's sixth anniversary this week at Tenison Woods College. Laudato Si was a pivotal encyclical by Pope Francis calling Catholics around the world to care for our common home, our planet. This encyclical provided the foundation for our College's focus on ecology and sustainability and has led to many whole school initiatives and curriculum integration over the past six years. This week we are enjoying six days of activities to acknowledge the critical importance of our ecological and sustainability platform as a school community, and the fun it can also create. Don't forget the Project Recology Open Morning for families, from 9:00am to 11:00am on Saturday 22 May.

National Reconciliation Week – More than a word. Reconciliation takes Action

Beginning next Wednesday 26 May, National Sorry Day, through to Thursday 3 June, members of faith communities across Australia are encouraged to offer prayers for reconciliation between Indigenous and other Australians. This year's theme for National Reconciliation Week is: Grounded in Truth, Walk Together with Courage.

National Day of Healing or Sorry Day (26 May) commemorates the anniversary of the tabling in 1997 of HREOC's Report of the National Inquiry into the Separation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children from their families, Bringing Them Home.

National Reconciliation Week occurs from 27 May to 3 June each year, as these two dates mark important anniversaries in Australia's history. On 27 May 1967, Australians passed a referendum that removed clauses from the Australian Constitution which discriminated against Indigenous Australians. On 3 June 1992, the High Court agreed with the position put in the Mabo case, that Australia had been occupied prior to European settlement, and as such, certain rights to native title were preserved by the Indigenous population. These two historic steps forwarded the recognition of Indigenous Australians and their rights, as they both reversed previously held beliefs.

Reconciliation Australia's theme for 2021, More than a word. Reconciliation takes action, urges the reconciliation movement towards braver and more impactful action. Reconciliation is a journey for all Australians – as individuals, families, communities, organisations and importantly as a nation. At the heart of reconciliation is the relationship between the broader Australian community and Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples. To foster positive race relations, our relationship must be grounded in a foundation of truth. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples have long called for a comprehensive process of truth-telling about Australia's colonial history. Our nation's past is reflected in the present, and will continue to play out in future unless we heal historical wounds.

Carpark Care

I remind families of the care required in the carpark area. The speed limit of 15km / hour is designed to assist with maintaining the safety of all community members. Likewise, the smooth running of the 'kiss and drop' area depends on the courtesy of all users to keep the traffic moving. Should children not be at the 'kiss and drop' area ready for pick up, I ask parents to complete another cycle of the area to ensure others can collect their waiting children.

HHDL Four Point Plan

Our current national context in recent times reminds us of the 'precarious confidence' that is present. I firmly believe that our complacency will be our enemy in the next eight months, and as such I reiterate that we will be continuing deliberately and carefully with our HHDL Strategy in Term 2.

I thank you in anticipation for your attention to the HHDL Four Point Plan; good health, good hygiene and hand washing, good distancing and care for others and good learning regardless of student location.

During Term 2, the health and wellbeing of students, families and staff remains our priority. We will continue to ensure that our school is a safe environment, maintaining the additional cleaning regime which was commenced in 2020.

Parish Planned Giving Rebate

I remind families that parents contributing to the Parish Planned Giving may claim a rebate from Tuition Fees of 50% of their contribution up to a maximum claim of \$750. Official Parish receipts are to be presented to the Finance Department after the 30 June 2021 for a deduction to be made.

34th Annual Cardijn Exchange

I am delighted with the way in which our students are preparing for the 34th annual Cardijn College Exchange. The sporting and debating competitions conducted this year at Cardijn College have a wonderful tradition of displaying impressive skill level, team spirit and fair play. Sincere thanks to all parents, staff and students who are involved in preparing for the exchange, with special thanks to Ian Ross, Year 7-12 Sports Coordinator, and the Health and Physical Education Team for their preparation of such a significant event on our College calendar.

Staff Professional Development Days – 10 and 11 June

Staff are looking forward to the staff professional development days on Thursday 10 and Friday 11 June, when they will devote time to literacy and numeracy experiences in the Junior School, Integrated curriculum in the Middle School, Student Agency in the Senior School, as well as evolving further our wellbeing approach at the school. Education Support Officers will also have the opportunity to complete the Youth Mental Health First Aid Course.

I trust students and parents will experience the benefits of the days through our service to students and families throughout the College. I remind families that these days are student-free days.

Nude Food and Minimising Bins Within the School

Buoyed by the Junior School's successful Nude Food initiative and the reduced waste within the school, we are looking to reduce the large dumpsters across the school. We will replace these large dumpsters with smaller bins and work toward a situation where we have a refined approach to external bins for:

1. General waste
2. Bottles and containers
3. Mixed recyclables – such as paper, cardboard etc
4. Green waste

We are committed to assisting the College in realising this ambition in a collaborative way. This issue is one of the major life learnings of our time for our young and I am committed to ensuring that we act with integrity as a school community and teach our children, through our actions, about the care for our planet. Anything you can do and advise as a family in relation to refining our processes will be gratefully received. I trust that with deliberate, creative and collaborative endeavour we can take this very ordinary issue of waste and achieve extraordinary outcomes for our school and the global community.

Creative Arts Spotlight

This semester Stage 1 Creative Arts students focused on their own skill development and were required to create pieces that reflected what they learnt in 8 weeks. Year 11 student Rosemary Rosemary focused on refining her skills in digital painting and Photoshop. Rosemary was inspired by the flat geometric style of Rafty A. The style allowed Rosemary to showcase her skills using the paintbucket, layer development and the use of contrasting colours. She then moved onto a piece inspired by online anime artists including Candle Bambi and Roal. Techniques explored included paintbrush: outlining the image so that proportions are right, utilising the smudge tool: and blending colours. Creating a more realistic feel. The contouring creates depth and highlighting helps to create dimension. The final piece and a self portrait is inspired by the digital work of NPye and demonstrates the loose lines and blending Photoshop allows.

We acknowledge last Wednesday 12 May was the the end of Ramadan for our Muslim sisters and brothers within our community.

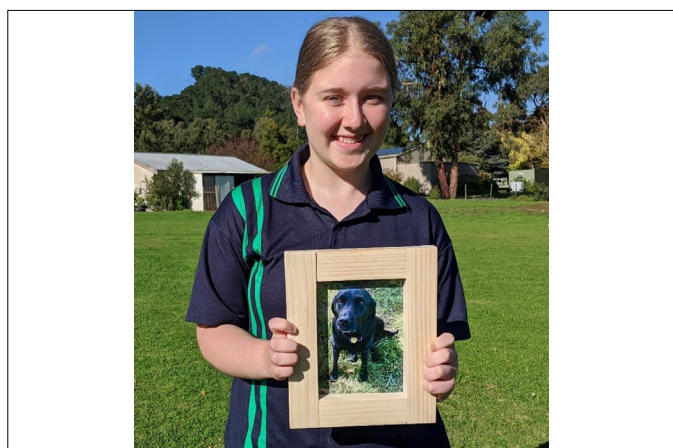

Buried under some early adolescent angst are tendencies for forgetfulness and poor organisation due to brain pruning, which is a 'trimming down' process in the teenage brain where irrelevant/unused mental connections from childhood are lost.

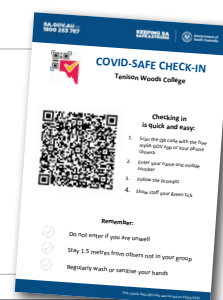

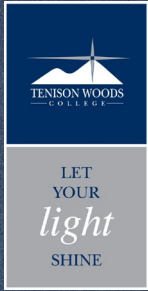
