COVID-19 - HHDL and Face Masks

I thank the whole College community for their continued deliberate, careful and patient approach to the South Australian COVID-19 restrictions.

Next term could families continue to ensure that Year 7-12 students arrive at school with a mask. These masks are to be worn on public transport, on school bus runs, and at school. Staff will ensure Middle and Senior School students are wearing a mask in enclosed spaces such as classrooms, tutorial rooms, offices and corridors.

We will continue to deliberately and carefully continue with our HHDL Strategy, asserting good Health, good Hygiene and hand washing, good Distancing and care for others, and good Learning regardless of student location.

As always, the health and wellbeing of students, families and staff remain our priority. If your family needs to self-isolate please contact your child's teacher and they will ensure that your child's learning will progress through our Connect@Tenison strategy.

Uniform Reminder – Extreme Hair

I remind families of the College policy in relation to uniform, and particularly students' hair. The policy indicates:

"Hair is to be clean and brushed or combed to maintain a neat and tidy appearance. Hair is also to be of a singular natural colour. All student hair, male and female, is to be tied up and secured neatly if at a length that can be pulled back. Students are not to have dreadlocks, rat's tails or other extreme styles and if a student's head is shaved, it is to be a minimum number two cut."

I further clarify that in a practical sense the College Leadership determine that hair which touches the collar of either the school shirt or school dress, would normally be tied up. This satisfies our duty of care, hygiene and Work Health and Safety obligations.

I further clarify for students and parents, the following haircuts are deemed as extreme: mullets of inappropriate length, rats tails, dreadlocks, mohawks, extreme uneven grades, extreme undercuts, and patterns or designs shaved into the hair.

I thank families in anticipation for your support in this matter. As I have often indicated, attention to the detail of clear and safe boundaries ensures that the larger issues do not eventuate in a school community.



We hope everyone has an enjoyable and relaxing break, readying themselves for another exciting term ahead.




























Ecological Conversion Year 11 Tree Planting

They have practiced the Wooden Joints, known as 'Castle Joints', which they will be using for their Products – Miyadaiku Inspired Tables!



Counsellor's Corner

This week we will focus on children understanding their big emotions and how they can regulate them. We invite you to read this insightful excerpt by trauma and stress specialist Dr Bruce Perry:

The brain is continually sensing and responding to the needs of the body. Specialised "thermostats" monitor our internal (for instance, levels of oxygen and sugar in the blood) and external worlds. When they sense something is wrong (that the body is "stressed"), they activate the brain's alarm systems. These stress-response systems then act to help the body get what it needs.

Leaving Families Function


I am delighted that on Thursday 23 September we took time to say farewell to a number of families who will complete their formal association with the College with their last child currently in Year 12.

Class Placements for 2022



Carers SA Young Carers

Carers SA supports Young Carers, people up to 26 years of age, who find themselves caring for someone who has an illness, a disability, a mental health issue, are frail aged or who has an alcohol or other drug problem. The person(s) receiving care may be a parent, partner, sibling, their own child, relative or friend.

Carers SA estimates there could be 30,500 young carers aged 25 years and under. Many of these are hidden carers.

Many young carers emphasise that caring is a positive experience. However, research clearly indicates that, when inadequately supported, young carer's health, mental health and wellbeing can be seriously affected. This, in turn, can influence schooling, socialising with friends and future careers.

The Young Carer worker may be able to support these young people further by linking them with FREE services such as:

- Counselling: Young Carers can access six sessions of counselling with a qualified youth counsellor.
- Carer Directed packages to help fund supports like cleaning and food preparation services, ensuring Young Carers can spend some time engaging in fun, meaningful activities to give them a break.
- Carer Directed Packages that provide financial support to keep Young Carers engaged in their education (for example financial contributions to textbooks or tutoring).
- Assisting Young Carers to access financial scholarship programs to help with the ongoing costs of education resources www.youngcarersnetwork.com.au
- Outreach Case-management for 3- 6 months, supporting Young Carers to work on their goals while building wellbeing and resilience in their caring roles.
- Peer Support Programs which provide group activities for Young Carers, allowing them an opportunity to connect with each other and have fun on a regular basis. This could be pizza nights, trips to the beach or cinema. We will look at creating activities based on the feedback and needs of the Young Carers involved in the program.
- Information sessions for school students and/or staff members to raise awareness of Young Carers in the community and the supports available for them, including the Carer Gateway and Young Carer Programs.

The Young Carer Bursary Program supports young carers to continue with their education. Young carers may be caring for parents, siblings, or grandparents that have an illness or disability. The program offers 1000 bursaries of \$3000 each year. Young carers aged 12-25 across Australia can apply now until 30th September.

The money can be put towards electronic equipment such as a laptop, school fees, uniforms, school camps, transport, and a range of other options. These items and expenses are often what young carers will go without when they are in a caring role. Please note that the application is not income tested.
