Refugee Week 2023 - Finding Freedom

This week we celebrate National Refugee Week. To live without the fear of war, to have your basic human rights upheld, to live in equality and without the fear of persecution are just some of the examples of what freedom can entail. Every day millions of people across the

world embark on dangerous journeys for the sole purpose of finding safety and freedom. From Australia to nations across

the globe, settling into a new environment after experiencing the perils of a refugee's journey can also provide the opportunity to live, to love and to dream.

Carpark Safety with the New MacKillop Junior School Building

We are learning about the impact of the building on vehicle and foot traffic within our community. As such, could we ask that families use the driveway adjacent to the ELCC to drop off students and use the central path between the ELCC/Reception building and the Administration building to access the MacKillop Junior School building.

If that approach causes families a challenge and the Pam Ronan Centre/Barrie Holmes Stadium driveway is used, could the walking paths to the MacKillop Junior School please be used.

In essence, using paths designated for walking will be the safest way to access the MacKillop Junior School Building.

Hosting Principals from the Association of Principals of Catholic Secondary Schools (APCSS)

I am delighted that today we hosted Principals from Catholic Secondary and Combined (Early Years to Year 12) Schools. Every second year the Principals meet in a regional location for their June Meeting. We hosted their meeting, followed by a Mass, tour of the College and then a meal together.

Parish Planned Giving Rebate

I remind families that parents contributing to the Parish Planned Giving may claim a rebate from Tuition Fees of 50% of their contribution, up to a maximum claim of \$750. Official Parish receipts are to be presented to the Finance Department after 30 June 2023 for a deduction to be made.

Students are able to connect to expert tutors for live, one-to-one conversations about homework, assignments and exam preparation from 3:00pm to 10:00pm, Monday to Friday. CESA COVID-19 Approach

The most recent CESA Covid 19 procedures state the following:

- Schools should continue to emphasise that students, staff and site visitors who are showing COVID-19 symptoms should stay away from school until acute symptoms (runny nose, sore throat, cough and fever) have cleared.
- Staff are required to notify the school if they return a positive COVID-19 test.
- Families are recommended to notify the school/centre if their child returns a positive COVID-19 test.

Phone Usage While Driving in the School Grounds – One of the FATAL FIVE I continue to appeal to parents about the discerning usage of mobile phones while driving in the vicinity of the school and on school grounds. Mobile phone usage has been identified by SAPOL as one of the FATAL FIVE (contributing to serious and fatal accidents in our roads).

I remind families that:

- You must not use a hand-held mobile phone while your vehicle is moving or stationary in traffic (e.g. at traffic lights).
- You may, however, use a hand-held mobile phone while your vehicle is parked.
- A mobile phone may only be used while you are driving to make or receive a phone call, provided the phone is secured in a commercially-designed and manufactured mounting device affixed to the vehicle, or the phone can be remotely operated.
- If the phone is used via Bluetooth or a headset or earphones without touching it, holding or resting the phone on your body, you may touch the headset or earpiece to operate the phone.
- It is an offence to create, send or look at a text, video or email and to rest the phone on any part of the body.

Using a phone includes:

- Holding the phone in your hand.
- Operating any function of the phone.

• Resting the phone on any part of your body.

These laws apply to drivers and riders of all vehicles. Current fine for using a Hand Held Mobile Phone is 554 + 92 (Victim of Crime Levy) = 646, with 3 demerit points.

SAPOL reminds us that 'Good Drivers Just Drive' and 'Road safety is everyone's responsibility'

Student Exemption Form Required for Absences Over 5 Days

If your child will be absent from school for more than 5 days, please ensure that you contact the Administration Office to obtain a Student Exemption Form. All absenteeism for more than 5 days is approved by myself and entered into our Attendance system, to ensure accurate records are maintained and family's government benefits and allowances are protected.


Little Lambs

The competition was held online throughout the month of May, which Kareena was able to complete during her Digital Technologies class.




Imor Leste Immersion and Soup Fundraiser


Tails Are Wagging!


