#### **Founders Week Fun**

#### Timor Leste Delegation \$8,000 Challenge

We have 'locked on to' the challenge put to us by our Timor Leste delegates. We now have a goal to raise a further \$8,000 before the next delegation departs on 23 September, so that the boarding school dormitory for girls in Hatolia can be completed. The delegation was shown the dormitory for 40 young girls who board at the school. The conditions were very basic and quite upsetting to see.

A new dorm is in the process of being built and as a group the delegation have made a promise to the girls to raise the required \$8,000 to finish the project before the next trip. So we were urged to roll up our sleeves as a community and raise the funds needed. #### **CESA Community LLL Perception Surveys**

By the conclusion of Week 5 of Term 3 all Catholic Schools in South Australia will complete the CESA Living, Learning, Leading Perception Surveys. The surveys are a product of a collaboration between Catholic Education SA (CESA) and Curtin University and are focussed on the development, validation and use of a system-wide survey to examine the understanding of the vision and extent to which Catholic Education SA's Living Learning Leading Framework is taking place in schools as perceived by students, family and staff.

Teacher and student surveys will be conducted in schools between weeks 1 and the end of Week 3, Term 3. Parent surveys can be conducted anytime up to the end of Week 5.

There are 7 surveys in total as described below.

1. Middle Primary Years 3 and 4
2. Upper Primary Years 5 and 6
3. Middle School Years 7, 8 and 9
4. Senior School Years 10, 11 and 12

6. ESO staff

7. Parent survey

Each survey has been trialled, refined and piloted in a range of CESA school settings and the development team is confident that schools will derive very useful information for planning and improvement.

#### Wellbeing Initiative - Classroom Pulse 'Check-In'

As in past years, each term this year during Week 5 and 6 every student in a Catholic School in South Australia will participate in a simple online Classroom Pulse Check-In. This check-in has been developed to ascertain how students are currently feeling about their experience in school. It is tailored to allow your child's teacher(s) to check-in and provide immediate feedback and support to them. The check-in will be carried out during the school day.

I am conscious that life in school has its' ups and downs, but I am also confident that your child's teachers want to understand how students are feeling so they are able to support you and your child in meeting any social, emotional, or learning needs that they may have.

To enable this, your child's teacher and I will have access to their responses to facilitate follow up and support as required. Please be assured, as your child's prime caregiver that any support required will be communicated and discussed with you in advance.

There are a range of simple questions about your child's life at school, their identity as a person and a learner, their sense of belonging, safety, and friendships. In addition to supporting your child, de-identified data from all participating schools will be used by Catholic Education SA to identify trends to assist in future planning for the support of the learning and wellbeing for students across South Australia.

Catholic Education SA believes that our role is to help every child to be a thriving person, capable learner and a leader for the world God desires. We believe this check-in will play an important part in supporting that goal and your child. Please do not hesitate to contact me if you require any further clarification.

#### Respect, Dignity and Care in an Online World

Online opportunities offer a significant source of connection, information and wellbeing. Such opportunities also reiterate for me the importance of our College 'village' in caring for the safety of our children, adolescents and emerging adults in a environments which can offer on the one hand abundant support, and then on the other hand significant risks.

In this space, I turn to the work of Susan McLean, one of Australia's foremost authorities in cyber safety, who encourages us to realise that:

- Respect and responsibility are to be used with consistency in the eWorld.
- Sending mixed messages about cyber safety is not life giving to children and confuses them.
- You can't have complacency online.
- Cyberspace is a public space and there is no such thing as private online.
- Nothing can be totally deleted it always remains there in cyberspace.
- You are never anonymous online everything can be traced, in that you always leave a digital footprint and your postings and comments can be found years later.
- Passwords are the key to your online security and must never be shared and should be changed every three months.
- Anyone can be anyone online caution is critical.
- There is no such thing as a safe website or application.

Unfortunately, over 30% of Australian teens report being cyber bullied and Susan identifies "a new mean" through the online medium which is occurring at a younger age. She also critiques the role of popular television shows which did not portray the real consequences to such situations of sexting and risky cyber behaviours. It is also apparent that cyber safety issues often touched the students you least expected.

Susan McLean is clear about the significant dangers in relation to online grooming and encourages us to think of an online friend as actually a stranger, with the associated dangers. She clarifies the nuance of knowing the person as distinct from knowing of the person, encouraging children and adolescents to be choosey in relation to friends.

We understand that all internet enabled devices (iPad, phone, iPod, Xbox) are best placed in a common area of the house and not in the bedroom; or at least turning the internet off when a child is in the bedroom with the device. Susan speaks of the importance of passive supervision in a well trafficked areas of the house. Just as with the opportunities of our globally connected 'real world,' I encourage parents and teachers to embrace the cyberspace, understand the salient issues, acknowledge positives and negatives, as well as be proactive and consistent so that our children and adolescents are afforded the real and actual life-giving safety that we hope.

#### **School Crossing Reminders**

I remind parents about the 25kmph speed limit through the School Crossing when the lights are flashing or at any time when children are present. Crossing monitors are on duty from 8:20am – 8:40am in the morning and from 3:10pm – 3:30pm in the afternoon to cross children safely. If a parent or child pedestrian is stopped there, waiting to cross, even before the crossing monitors have arrived, please stop and allow them to cross.

Please note that it is a legal obligation for drivers at the crossing when the lights are flashing and it is not attended by crossing guards:

- 25kmh must be attained BEFORE the 25 sign, and the drivers must STOP when adults OR children have stood at the side to try and cross.
- Speed must NOT be increased until AFTER the 50kmh sign.

As per legislation, you are also asked not to obstruct the crossing, whilst waiting in a line-up of traffic.





# Newcastle University Science and Engineering Challenge

Last Wednesday, thirty of our Year 8,9 and 10 students competed in the Newcastle University Science and Engineering Challenge held at the Wulanda Recreation and Convention Centre.

Students were split into teams of up to four and had to complete challenges as diverse as making a balsa plane that was tested for distance and accuracy, routing electricity to maximise efficiency in an imaginary city, creating a code to communicate with coloured light, and building a bridge that was tested to destruction. Our students represented the school admirably, and although we did not win overall, the bridge created by Year 10 group D'arci Bell, Sammie Considine, James Taylor and Brooke Hammond was equal best on the day, surviving all weights placed on it up to the "Bridge Buster."

## Year 10 Discussion Panel

The Year 10 cohort were audience to a panel discussion on career pathways in Week 4. Featuring James Stapleton, a Radiographer with Benson Radiology, Tahlia Gabrielli, Principal of Ray White Real Estate, Chloe Mackenzie, Scholarship Forester with OneFortyOne, and Kyle Summers, Mechanical Supervisor at OneFortyOne, each shared details of their respective career journeys.

All four panellists discussed the importance of giving something a 'go', having good verbal and written communication skills, and demonstrating initiative and interest.

It was particularly interesting to have Chloe speak of her journey, having graduated as DUX in 2020 at Tenison Woods College and immediately moving to Adelaide to pursue a Bachelor of Medical Science. Having spent six months in Adelaide and not enjoying her degree, she took time off and returned to Mount Gambier to live. In 2022, she decided to study a Bachelor of Science (majoring in Earth and Environmental Systems) online, which has allowed her to remain living in Mount Gambier. In late 2022, she applied for the OneFortyOne Scholarship Program, and joined the team in February this year. She now works at OneFortyOne three days a week while continuing to study full-time. The scholarship program allows Chloe to rotate through different teams within the Forestry sector of the business and learn how they all come together for the lifecycle of the tree, from planting to final harvest and delivery to customers. Chloe currently works in the Resources team, assisting with research projects on how OneFortyOne can incorporate more remote sensing into inventory programs. She will move into the two-year graduate program with OneFortyOne in 2025 after she graduates. It was also a highlight having Maelee Dalton attend as an observer.

Maelee is a previous student of the College and is now completing a Traineeship with Ray White Real Estate. Maelee has pursued her interest in real estate since Year 10 when she commenced VET studies. Following successful work placements, she was offered the opportunity to continue her studies and work with Tahlia at Ray White Real Estate.

For students to be able to hear from, and see, what recent graduates have done is always invaluable. We thank all panellists for sharing their time and perspectives.

Sam answered that 'Penguin Bloom' came into her life at the right time, and left at the right time'. Reconnecting to her water passions also helped her with her mental health. Sam has represented Australia at the World Para-Canoeing Championships in 2015 and won gold for her country at both the 2019 and 2020 World Para Surfing Championships.

Sam's story has now been made into a film 'Penguin Bloom' played by Naomi Watt, and is opening up a conversation about the representation of acquired disability on screen.
